- We cannot avoid *people* because God is concerned about everyone.
- We cannot avoid *problems* because lost people bring problems.

How to Become a Christian

Many people believe they are Christians because they were born in a Christian culture, go to church regularly, try to do their best, or live a good life. However, the Bible teaches that these things cannot make you a Christian. You become a Christian by simply taking these two steps:

- Acknowledge that you (along with all people) have sinned and fallen short of God's standards. ROMANS 3:23
- Personally believe that Jesus Christ, who was God in human flesh, died for your sins on the cross and rose again. 1 CORINTHIANS 15:3, 4

You may express your belief through prayer, asking Jesus to come into your life, and receiving Him as God's gift to you. JOHN 1:12, ROMANS 6:23, REVELATION 3:20

EPHESIANS 2:8, 9 For it is by grace you have been saved through faith...it is the gift of God; not by works, so that no one can boast.

Acts 8:4-25

Review

The Book of Acts transitions from the earthly ministry of Christ to the Spirit-infused ministry of Christ through His church.

Key Verse

Acts 1:8 But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.

Acts Thus Far

Acts 1:1-8:3 Jesus created a people, indwelt and empowered by His Spirit, to proclaim His gospel in all the world.

- *The Promise*—To receive power from the Holy Spirit and be witnesses throughout all the world (AcTs 1:8)
- *The Power*—The Holy Spirit manifests himself through His people to save in mighty and miraculous ways. (Acts 2:1-13; 3:1-10; 5:12-16)
- *The Proclamation*—Disciples boldly speak of Jesus to those who do not know Him, leading thousands to faith in Him. (Acts 2:14-41; 3:11-26; 7:1-53)
- *The People*—The new community continually grows in unity, love, generosity, prayerfulness and joy while seeking to deal honestly and openly with sin. (Acts 2:42-47; 4:22-37; 5:1-11; 6:1-7)
- The Persecution—Opposition quickly comes to the disciples as they proclaim Jesus, resulting in beatings and even death. But an unexpected consequence was that it led to gospel expansion. (Acts 4:1-22; 5:17-52; 6:8-15; 7:54-8:3)

Key Transitions in Us as We Study

- From attending to *expectant*
- From unknown to *connected*
- From spectator to disciple-maker

Out of the Box

The gospel sends us to places we don't expect, saves people we wouldn't consider and subjects us to problems we want to avoid.

ACTS 8:4-8 Those who had been scattered preached the word wherever they went. ⁵ Philip went down to a city in Samaria and proclaimed the Christ there. ⁶ When the crowds heard Philip and saw the miraculous signs he did, they all paid close attention to what he said. ⁷ With shrieks, evil spirits came out of many, and many paralytics and cripples were healed. ⁸ So there was great joy in that city.

Acts 8:9-13 Now for some time a man named Simon had practiced sorcery in the city and amazed all the people of Samaria. He boasted that he was someone great, ¹⁰ and all the people, both high and low, gave him their attention and exclaimed, "This man is the divine power known as the Great Power." ¹¹ They followed him because he had amazed them for a long time with his magic. ¹² But when they believed Philip as he preached the good news of the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. ¹³ Simon himself believed and was baptized. And he followed Philip everywhere, astonished by the great signs and miracles he saw. • God ______ the expansion of the gospel with the apostles.

Acts 8:14-17 When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. ¹⁵ When they arrived, they prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit, ¹⁶ because the Holy Spirit had not yet come upon any of them; they had simply been baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus. ¹⁷ Then Peter and John placed their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

• Peter _____ Simon's sin.

The *request* exposes the heart.

Acts 8:18-19 When Simon saw that the Spirit was given at the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money ¹⁹ and said, "Give me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit."

The *rebuke* speaks to the heart.

Acts 8:20-24 Peter answered: "May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God with money! ²¹ You have no part or share in this ministry, because your heart is not right before God. ²² Repent of this wickedness and pray to the Lord. Perhaps he will forgive you for having such a thought in your heart. ²³ For I see that you are full of bitterness and captive to sin."

²⁴ Then Simon answered, "Pray to the Lord for me so that nothing you have said may happen to me."

The gospel ______ to advance.

Acts 8:25 When they had testified and proclaimed the word of the Lord, Peter and John returned to Jerusalem, preaching the gospel in many Samaritan villages.
